

## **Program Differences**

Cap on Rental Arrears & Forgiveness of Rental Debt	<ul> <li>If landlord participates:</li> <li>Up to 80% of unpaid rent from April 2020 through March 2021</li> <li>Landlord must agree to forgive the remaining 20%</li> <li>If landlord refuses to participate:</li> <li>Tenants limited to 25% of unpaid rent</li> </ul>	Up to 100% unpaid rent, up to 12 months total of arrears and prospective rent
Cap on Prospective Rent	Prospective rent limited to 25% of monthly rent, 3 months at a time, but not no more than 12 months total of arrears and prospective rents	100% of monthly rent, 3 months at a time, but no more than 12 months total of arrears and prospective rents

#### **OPTIONS ANALYSIS** Reserves State funds (\$8.7 million) for City Consistency for landlords and tenants throughout the state/region Avoidance of duplication of benefits Program delivery/outreach within the local area is tailored to meet local needs – partnering with LISC and other providers State responsible for administration and program delivery and risk Least administrative burden to City and will not require additional City City administers State and staff resources May serve more people as the State restricts how much a landlord or Federal funds tenant can receive and State funds reserved for City Landlord and/or tenant would not have the same opportunity to receive as much debt relief as City's design under Fed rules Shortened deadlines (as compared to federal deadlines) for obligating and expending funds City solely responsible for compliance with all applicable state and federal management/implementation/reporting requirements

	<ul> <li>City can implement its own program design (100% of rents) for fed funds</li> <li>Residents still have access to State program</li> </ul>		
C Separate and concurrent State and Local Programs	<ul> <li>State funds are not reserved for City</li> <li>May serve less people due to higher rent payments and less State funds</li> <li>Two separate programs running concurrently and differing City of SD and County programs may cause confusion</li> <li>City takes on burden of ensuring no duplicative benefits (high audit liability)</li> </ul>
