Background



- Began at the Rio Earth Summit in 1992
- COP3 where the Kyoto Protocol was adopted in 1997 (Chula Vista attended and signed letter of support)
- COP 21 local and subnational governments are recognized as essential actors in fast tracking transformative action in the urban world

Why Cities Are So Important



Cities represent 2% of global land area but generate 70% of GHG emissions. Also, 90% of cities are on coastal or inter-coastal waterways



Cities are in the best position to affect change by implementing smart city planning which can lower energy costs and improve mobility and quality of life.



Real momentum can only occur when nations and cities collaborate.



If cities take climate action in three sectors – buildings, transportation and waste – the impact would be greater than the total emissions of the United States and 28 member states of the European Union combined.



- The Leaders Circle committed to the Compact of Mayors





Launched at the 2014 UN Climate Summit



Through the Compact, cities are:

- Increasing their visibility as leaders responding to climate change
- Demonstrating their commitment to an ambitious global climate solution
- Encouraging direct public and private sector investments in cities by meeting transparent standards similar to those followed by national governments
- Building a consistent and robust body of data on the impact of city action
- Establishing a common platform to capture the impact of cities collective actions
- Accelerating more ambitious, collaborative, and sustainable local climate actions



Paris City Hall Declaration

"We declare solemnly that climate change is our common challenge and that advancing climate solutions is a shared responsibility, and a matter of rights, equality and social justice. An effective, global response to climate change presents one of the greatest economic opportunities of the 21st century, will protect public health, and strengthen sustainable development mindful of human rights and women's empowerment"

UNFCCC COP 21 Agreement





Unanimously approved by 195 nations



Confirms to limit global warming to well below 2° degrees Celsius, with the intent to pursue a 1.5° target to protect island states which are the most threatened by rise in sea levels.



Countries will review their contributions toward reducing their greenhouse gas emissions every five years from 2020



Agreement acknowledges that \$100 billion must be raised each year through 2020 to finance projects that will enable countries to adapt to the impacts of climate change or reduce greenhouse gas emissions.



Establishes an obligation for industrialized countries to fund climate finance for poor countries



Creates a stronger system for tracking commitments




