Brief History

- Surge of mobile food facilities vending activity
- City Council direction
- Reviewed regulations from other jurisdictions
- Meetings with mobile food facility and restaurant representatives
- Public workshops
- Planning Commission

Intent

- Benefit the community by allowing more dinning experiences
- **Entrepreneurial opportunity**
- Brick-and-mortar restaurants serve at different locations
- Attract more customers to businesses, breweries, and special events
- Regulate mobile food facilities on private and public property and the public right-of-way

Purpose

- **Protect the public**
- Compliance with health, safety and, traffic laws
- Conduct business equitably
- Prevent traffic congestion and pedestrian and vehicular conflicts

Quiet use and peaceful enjoyment of residential neighborhoods

Vendors

- Annual Vending Permit (\$135)
- Vend on property with an existing business
- Vend at education and religious institutions
- Not permitted on vacant lots or gas service stations

Allowed

- Condiment table, belly bars and chairs
- One 10' x 10' pop-up canopy
- A-frame signage

Not Allowed

Exterior:

- Heaters
- Generators
- Electrical cords
- Hoses
- Tents
- Impact on parking

Hosts

- Annual Hosting Permit (\$250)
- Authorized person
- Access to restrooms

Private Catering

- Parked on private property
- Limited service to guests
 - Payment transactions

Public Right of Way

Cannot be located within 30 feet of an intersection

Curbside sales only

• No stopping or parking on a public street

Enforcement

- Permits valid for one year
- Three violations
 - No permit two years after the last violation
