Who ARE we?

- OVER 25 grassroots, community-based, faith-based, civil and immigrant rights org's
 - ACCE
 - ACLU
 - AFSC
 - South Bay People Power
 - o etc.
- HUNDREDS of concerned Chula Vista residents, workers and visitors
- INCLUDING community members often targeted by surveillance and over-policing (immigrants, LGBTQ, people of color, etc.)

Why are we calling for you to STOP and LISTEN?

- Unchecked surveillance technology poses a threat to our safety and civil rights
- Chula Vista should be a leader in protecting its Welcoming City
 - 2017: Council vote to join Welcoming America
 - 2019: First in CA to earn designation as a Certified Welcoming City
 - Awarded to local governments that meet the rigorous Welcoming Standard requirements for immigrant inclusion.
 - Calls for a higher standard to provide:
 - Accountability
 - Public access
 - Systems of inclusion

How have we tried to engage with you?

- Dec 8, 2020: Over 30 community members submitted eComments opposed to ALPR surveillance
- Dec 17, 2020: CPRA request for details about the ALPR program and contacts
- Dec 18, 2020: Letter to Mayor & Council signed by over 20 org's plus numerous concerned community members
- Jan 4, 2021: Over 40 community members submitted eComments in opposition
- Mar 22: Letter to City Attorney and City Manager signed by 25 org's and over 50 concerned community members
- Mar 23: nearly 60 eComments, emails, letters in opposition to ALPR
- April 7: Tried to speak at police forum but technology was not community-friendly
- April 12: Small group met with Mayor
- April 14: 70 eComments and emails submitted in opposition to ALPR

What have we heard back from you?

- Public statements by city officials that have misrepresented and often miscounted the number of eComments submitted in opposition to ALPR
- Partial but delayed groups of documents in response to our CPRA requests
- Mar 19: a 5-sentence email reply (after resending our ad hoc group Dec 18 letter to the Mayor)
- To date: No acknowledgement or reply to our ad hoc group letter sent Mar

How have the CVPD and the City as a whole failed to Self-Regulate to protect ALL community members?

- Data sharing Was not understood; still not able to control third-party sharing
- Legal compliance Defensive letter of the law; not actively working to protect
 - O SB 54
 - O SB 34
 - SB 210 License Plate Privacy Act
- Lack of transparency
- Lack of accountability
- Damage to community trust

How has the City failed to ensure Public Access to City Governance?

- Lack of community-friendly options or expressed concern about public access during pandemic
- Repeated claims to have worked with community organizations, none of which support the ALPR program or have met officially with the PD on this issue
- Pervasive lack of respect for community members
 - Repeatedly calling opposing comments "misinformation" or "opinions"
 - Responding to community inquiries and concerns by repeating "facts" as presented by the CVPD
 - Blaming the community comments for creating fear among undocumented

How has the City failed to provide Responsible Oversight of its ALPR program?

- No public debate prior to seeking funding and change in contract to Vigilant Solutions
- Lack of transparency regarding total costs, funding sources not included in Report
- Lack of accountability for decisions made; remedies not adequate
- No independent oversight of CVPD
- Members of city governance groups (Chief's CAC, HRC) have not taken time to inform themselves independently about how the ALPR program works, what problems they present, etc.

What do we want?

- Chula Vista to LIVE UP to its promise to be a Welcoming City
- Provide detailed answers to our serious questions (no glittering generalities; we want data)
- Listen to community concerns that still have not been addressed in reports, and now in the proposal
- Establish on-going INDEPENDENT, community-led oversight of the City's use of surveillance technology
- Stop the ALPR program until a process for oversight is in place
- Do NOT renew the contract with Vigilant

What is INDEPENDENT Community-led Oversight?

- Informed Public Debate at Earliest Stage of Process
- Determination that Benefits Outweigh Costs and Concerns
- Thorough Surveillance Use Policy
- Ongoing Oversight & Accountability

CITY COUNCIL is responsible for policy, including funding priorities; NOT the police.
